Mother's Nature: "I like setting the stage for families to have warm, happy times here. I have an empathy for what families and especially mothers go through when they're on vacation."

Mother's touch: "A few years ago I overheard some kids in the cafeteria line saying they didn't have enough money to buy lunch. So the cafeteria

manager and I got together and designed a kids' sack lunch with peanut butter and jelly sandwiches for just \$1.50. We also slipped in some carrot sticks to keep the lunches healthy."

The first time: "I skied for the first time in the late Forties when I was maybe 6 years old. My dad and some friends had rigged up a rope-tow powered by a Model T engine on Pine Street Hill in Sandpoint, Idaho."

The first time, part II: "My first ski trip was to Sun Valley when I was about 13. We took the train there with about 50 friends and family. I remember sunshine and fun and freedom. It was a magical trip."

The view from here: "It's invigorating to take in the spectacular view of Lake Pend Oreille while I'm floating along on my skis."
