Designs on greatness Co-owner and head designer for Burning Snow, a pioneering snowboard clothing company in a market that now boasts more than 150 apparel makers.

The first time "It was in 1987, at Mt. Baldy, Calif. I was wearing nylon shell pants and froze my ass off. But I didn't care. I was instantly addicted to snowboarding. It changed my life."

Burning desire "I started Burning Snow that same year. I saw a huge market for snowboard clothing and I thought the surf market (I had worked for Quiksilver and then Maui & Sons) was saturated."

Lactic overload "We called the company Burning Snow because our legs were burning after snowboarding all day. We were so amped—we'd ride all day without eating lunch."

The only thing missing is Mickey "My favorite place to ride is Snow Summit, Calif. They really like riders there, and their park is insane—like a Disneyland for snowboarders. Plus, it's only an hour and a half from my house in Newport Beach."

Droop doggy dog "The grungy, baggy look is history. Last season, the trend was to see who could have the biggest pants. It was a little ridiculous. People used six yards of fabric to make a pair of pants when you needed only two yards."

Back to the future "This year you'll see more standard silhouettes and more vibrant colors in snowboard clothing. There will be a cleaner, preppier, more retro look—a Fifties look."

Cross-dressing "I see more and more skiers wearing snowboard clothing. That's because snowboarding apparel has a big edge on durability snowboarders really abuse their clothing—and also in style. Ski clothing is so boring. If I were a skier, I'd want to wear something cool and hip like snowboard clothing." —Reade Bailey
